

2009-2010 AISD Parent Survey

Strong relationships among staff, students, and parents are critical to student success. In particular, parent involvement in education is associated with a high level of student achievement (for a meta-analysis see Fan & Chen, 2001). These survey results provide

In Spring 2009, 163 parents returned surveys for Reilly, representing 54% of students from Reilly (compared to the district Elementary School response, 34%). Figure 1 represents the percentage of respondents with children at Reilly from each ethnic group. The tables below show the total number of surveys Reilly parents returned in 2009-2010, and the percentage of responses and students at Reilly represented by each grade.
